Valparaiso University is in the town of Valparaiso, in the northwest corner of the state. It is just off U.S. 30, 50 miles east of Chicago, at the intersections of state highways 49 and 2. The town is 8 miles south of the Valparaiso-Chesterton Exit on the Indiana Toll Road. The campus is strikingly visible from U.S. 30, by virtue of a new chapel. The Union Building, in which all the sessions will be held, is at the end of Union Street, and 200 feet from the new chapel.
